November in the Garden, by Richard Porter

What happens now? The season of growth for us as gardeners, (for us plant, shrub, grass and tree people) is really coming to a close. This year we had a killing frost on a late October day. Green tomatoes must be picked and brought indoors to ripen. Watch out for deer which seem to be everywhere they shouldn't be (we hit a doe near dusk on Newburg Road recently).

Leaves have turned their beautiful colors and are falling. November temperatures bounce around so that even with nightly lows in the 20's, several of our daytime temperatures may reach into the high 70's and low 80's. Warm days will give us a chance to remove spent annuals, dead hyacinth bean vines, tomato vines, daylily scapes, etc. It is also a good time to plant bulbs for spring blooms or to scatter some poppy seeds. Occasionally my re-blooming iris will bless us with some flowers, and a clematis vine will produce some late blooms. Hooray!! Extra rainfall really helps with the re-bloomers. If you absolutely must move a daylily, do it quickly and take as much of the dirt ball as possible in order to reduce plant shock.

One last caveat. On November 17, 2014, in my garden diary I noted: "first snow - 3/3". Schools closed and DSL meeting cancelled.
